NEW ROAD SURFACE

You may notice Balfour Beatty Living Places highways workers continuing to carry out work on the road network.

I’d just like to highlight the paragraph on Drainage.

Indeed at the last full Council Meeting I put this question (below) to the Leader:-

“I have a number of ongoing drainage issues in my Ward which the Drainage Team were investigating and trying to solve – this was prior to the major storms / extensive flooding Herefordshire was subject to, consequently these drainage issues have got much worse & long standing floods have resulted in road closures lasting a very long time (as many other Members will no doubt have experienced in their Ward areas too) The drainage issues need tackling and resolving in a timely manner– as a matter of urgency - Leader will you direct more resources to the Balfour Beatty’s Land Drainage Team, so they can cope better with the extra demand at this time.”

Leader’s Paragraph on Drainage

Drainage: The last few months have reiterated the need for more investment in drainage throughout the county. Reinvesting back into drainage without the appropriate funding from Central Government means there may be less money spent on other road projects but it is vital to do so if we are to properly address our drainage issues. I have asked officers and BBLP we hope to apportion a significant amount of that for drainage improvements to network, liaising with the parish councils and using their local knowledge to get the work done precisely where it is needed most. The lengthsman money put aside for drainage work in the 2019/20 budget is doing its governance circulation.

I pleased that some more investment will be directed towards drainage issues.
